Ch. 6 – *Large stone, 9 feet 5 inches by 3 feet 9 inches, fixed to the north wall of St George's Chapel.*

Waye Monument.

The large stone of rough Purbeck Marble once covered the vault of the Waye family. The inscription round the edge of the stone reads: -

"Here lieth WYLLIAM WAYE, sometime Mayor of Lostwithiel, who deceased this lyfe the 12th of October in Ann Dom. 1597, and ELIZABETH his wyffe, sister to JOHN SOUTHCOTE, one of the Judges of the Queen's Majesty's Bench, who died the 13th of April, Anno Dom. 1584."

In the centre, the inscription continues: - "Who had issue three daughters, Temperance, Alice, and Emelyn. Made at the cost of W. Kendall."

Within the outside marginal inscription at each corner, is a shield of a peculiar and fanciful shape. That in the dexter corner at the top shews the arms of Waye, singly—a Chevron between 3 lucies. That in the sinister corner opposite, contains the arms of Waye impaled with Southcote for femme—a Chevron between 3 coots. The shield in the dexter base corner gives Southcote impaling Tregonwell, on a fesse cotised, between 3 Cornish choughs, as many pellets. The corresponding shield in the sinister base has Tregonwell alone.

This large stone was recycled by William Kendall as a memorial to his deceased wife's parents. The arrangement of the heads of nails or rivets of unusually large size, which still remain in the stone, indicate that the stone once contained a large canopied brass.

Ch. 9 – Mural Monument on the South Wall close to the east end



This monument shows a female figure kneeling at a prayer desk with five children in the same posture behind her. Two almost obliterated figures stand behind them. Under the figures are the words: -

The arms above, quartering *Waye*, show that it was erected to a descendant of Temperance Kendall, née *Waye*.

Ch. 10 – On the bottom of the left hand side of the altar rail of the St George's Chapel.

In Memory of AUGUSTA MARIA HART. Died June 16th 1938.

Ch. 11 – Under the carpet in front of the altar rail of the St George's Chapel.

Slate gravestone which marks the burial place of of WILLIAM KENDALL and his second son, WALTER KENDALL. The Kendall coat of arms is in the centre of this stone and, around its margin, there is inscribed: -

Hic jacet () GUILLILMI KENDALLI, Armigeri qui obiit quinto die Septembris Anno 1591—et GUALTERI KENDALLI filio Secundo qui obiit decimo tertio die Octobris 1603.

Translation of this Latin inscription: Here lies () WILLIAM KENDALL, Esquire who died 15th day of September 1591— And WALTER KENDALL his second son who died 13th day of October 1603.

Ch. 12 – A palimpsest on the ledge of the first window in the south wall.

On what is now the back of this stone, there is a what has been described as “a deeply carved very beautiful cross, five feet one inch long and two feet three inches across its broadest part”. It would appear that this stone originally marked the burial place of an Ecclesiastic but was removed from the Church either on the dissolution of St George's Chantry in 1549 or at the beginning of the reign of Elizabeth I. Originally an inscription was engraved around the edge of the stone but, due to the cutting of the stone, all that remains is “..... ate pro ani” at the top.

Subsequently the stone was recycled on the back by WILLIAM KENDALL as a memorial to his wife, TEMPERANCE. The Kendall coat of arms is in the centre of this stone and, around the edge are the remains of an inscription which originally read: -

“Here lieth TEMPERANCE the wiffe of WILLIAM KENDALL, Jantlman, whoe desessed the 9 day of Oct. the 21st of Elizabeth, & an'o domini 1579.”

Pieces of broken slate – inscription unreadable except for the name “William Taprell.”

These pieces of slate are believed to be part of the original slate slab on the altar tomb of William Taprell which is in the Churchyard on the east side of the south entrance to the Church.

According to page 90 of Memorials of Lostwithiel by Miss F M Hext, published privately by her in 1891, the original slate slab, was 'much broken', and was ornamented, with an engraved and scrolled border of flowers and leaves, within which was inscribed: -

'Here lieth the body of WILLIAM TAPRELL, often Mayor of this Borough of was buried the of
“All flesh is grass, whose verdure quietly fades,
The brightest day soon terminates in shades,
Of worldly grandeur vain is the whole story,
Virtue alone crowns with immortal glory.”'

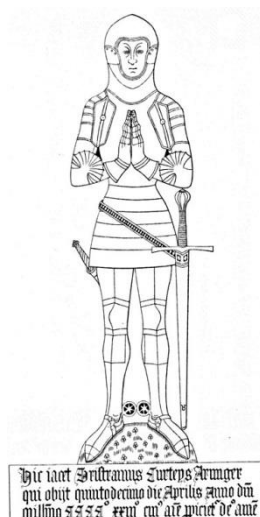

This monumental brass is believed to be the earliest of a military figure in the county and fortunately did not suffer the fate of the three other brasses which were once in the Church – See Ch. 6., Ch. 65. & Ch.68. It is rather worn and a better impression of its former beauty can be gauged from this copy of a drawing which was published in “Monumental Brasses of Cornwall” by Edwin Hadlow Wise Dunkin in 1882.

This brass was fixed against the wall in 1878 and the stone, which originally held it, was placed on the floor of the belfry on the north side of the arch, entering from the Church. Subsequently this stone was covered by new flooring and is no longer visible.

Tristram Curteys was the son of Thomas Curteys of Pill in Lanlivery and his wife, Matilda, daughter of Sir Thomas Fitzwalter of Northampton. Tristram Curteys was a member of Parliament for Lostwithiel in 1419 and 1421.

Here lieth the body of

Ch. 70 – A stone which originally held a brass in the centre and a shield in each corner and was set in the pavement of the north aisle immediately above the step which divided the chancel from the nave.
